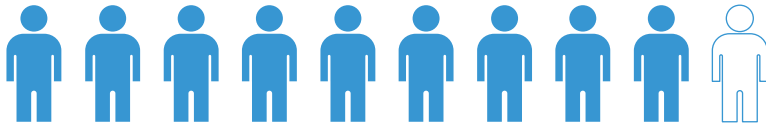

Did you know that

 Penicillin is the **most commonly reported drug allergy**¹

Most patients lose their penicillin allergy after **10 years**¹



However, **nine out of 10 patients** reporting a penicillin allergy are not truly allergic



Broad-spectrum antibiotics may cause **treatment-resistant superbugs, like MRSA and C-Diff**²

When patients are penicillin allergy tested

98%

of hospitalized patients with a history of penicillin allergy would have a negative allergy test result²

Healthcare providers can prescribe less expensive, less toxic, and more **appropriate antibiotics**

Know the facts and get tested

Be sure to ask your doctor if you are a candidate for penicillin allergy testing and discuss the benefits and risks of getting tested

Let's Chat about Penicillin Allergy Testing

Q: I was told **I had a penicillin allergy when I was younger**. Is there a possibility that I might not have my allergy anymore?

Q: What do I do to **find out if I am still allergic** to penicillin?

Q: If my penicillin **allergy test comes back negative**, am I free to take penicillin again?

A: **Yes, this is very possible.** Nine out of 10 patients reporting a penicillin allergy are not actually allergic.

A: **It's simple!** Ask your pharmacist or physician to explain penicillin allergy testing. If you decide to get tested, it only takes about an hour.

A: If your test is negative, your healthcare provider will advise you on **whether or not you can receive penicillin antibiotics**. It's important to share your results with all healthcare providers as it can impact your antibiotic options.
